# A center for industry

Home to some of the largest manufacturing plants in the nation, Granville County is known for its welcoming atmosphere and skilled workforce. With six interstate 85 exchanges, its close proximity to the Research Triangle Park and the Virginia border, and hundreds of growing and thriving businesses, Granville is poised to become one of the most prized areas for industry in North Carolina.

# Transportation options

**Highways and Interstates:** Granville County offers convenient access to major cities and industrial hubs from anywhere in the county.

- There are six **Interstate 85** interchanges, connecting the area to the entire east coast;
- **Interstate 40** is a few miles from the southern end of Granville County, providing easy access to east-west travel;
- **Interstate 95** (north-south corridor) is less than an hour away along Interstate 40.



**Airports:** The Raleigh-Durham International Airport, which offers a multitude of non-stop destinations and more than 400 daily flights, is just forty miles away from Oxford, the county seat.



The Henderson-Oxford Airport, located just off Interstate 85, is ideal for corporate aircraft and is an hour's drive from Durham, Raleigh and the Research Triangle Park. It is also only three miles from Granville County's Triangle North industrial site, which includes more than 500 acres of development-ready land.

**Railways:** Several areas in the county are rail-accessible, providing an additional option for shipping materials to/from manufacturing sites by train.

**Seaports:** Cargo facilities in Wilmington, NC and Norfolk, VA are easily accessible, due to the county's proximity to Interstates 85 and 40, making international shipping another viable option. Wilmington and Norfolk are less than three hours away from Granville County.

# Triangle North Park



**Triangle North Granville** is a life sciences and technology park located in the northern portion of the Research Triangle Region of North Carolina, one of the most economically competitive locations in the world. It includes more than 500 acres of development-ready land in an easily-accessible location.

Triangle North Granville offers promising companies access to a broad range of assets, amenities and resources, including:

- state-certified sites;
- access to water and sewer;
- electric system plans in place to install power when needed;
- a short drive from Interstate 85;
- a forty-minute commute from Raleigh-Durham International Airport;
- close proximity (four miles) from the Henderson-Oxford Airport;
- a short drive to the Research Triangle Park, the largest research park in the country;
- Access to researchers, professors and students of Duke University, North Carolina State University and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, all three leading research universities;
- an eight-minute drive to the main campus of Vance-Granville Community College, which provides access to customized workforce training;
- three miles of I-85 frontage.

At Triangle North Granville, you can choose your own site! The map below is a conceptual layout of the park, with site locations noted. Building locations and specifications can be adjusted to accommodate the needs of each individual company.

**Site map: Triangle North Granville**


# Education in Granville



The Granville County Public School System offers a variety of learning opportunities to more than 7,200 students. Elementary schools offer choice programs such as character education, the arts, healthy/active living, a global focus, character education, project-based learning and S.T.E.M. while secondary schools offer challenging programs in engineering, robotics, health sciences, the arts, business and entrepreneurship, JROTC, veterinary sciences and industrial trades.

In partnership with Vance-Granville Community College, Granville Early College High School allows students to graduate with a high school diploma *and* a two-year Associates Degree.

In addition to the 17 schools in the Granville County Public School system are two charter schools in the county. Falls Lake Academy in Creedmoor serves grades K-12, while Oxford Preparatory School provides instruction for grades 6-12 as it continues to grow and add more grade levels.



**Higher education:** North Carolina boasts a seventeen-campus state university system, fifty-eight community colleges and thirty-six private colleges and universities. In Granville and nearby counties, Vance-Granville Community College (VGCC), offers more than 40 curriculum programs, including logistics, mechatronics and welding. There are four VGCC campuses to serve Vance, Granville, Franklin and Warren counties, as well as online courses and training programs. Students can take courses during the day, at night or online.



# A skilled workforce



## **Advanced training opportunities**

For companies interested in locating to the area, one of Granville County's greatest resources is Vance-Granville Community College, which provides customized basic and advanced training to future employees. From entrepreneurial start-ups to multi-national firms, college officials work closely with new, expanding and existing companies of all sizes to provide resources and training tailored to meet each employer's needs. Many training services are offered at little or no cost to the businesses, with training often provided on-site at company facilities.

In addition to technical training, instruction in safety and "soft" skills are also offered such as leadership, team building and customer service.

With its multi-campus locations - as well as online courses - VGCC's educational and training programs help meet the needs of all local businesses, helping them stay up-to-date and competitive in today's ever-changing global economy.

# Health and safety



**Granville Health System:** is dedicated to providing quality service and convenient care to Granville County residents. Known for its state-of-the-art facilities and its caring physicians and staff, Granville Health System has been recognized both statewide and nationally. With 11 locations throughout the county, patients and family members have access to the care they need, when they need it most. **Granville Vance Public Health:** The mission of Granville Vance Public Health (GVPH) is to protect and promote health in the two counties it serves. This mission is accomplished through collaboration with local partners who work to anticipate, identify, and meet the community's needs.

**Sheriff's Office and community partners:** Safety is a county priority, evidenced by the fact that Granville County is one of the safest areas in the northern portion of North Carolina. The Granville County Sheriff's Office and the community are partners, working together through programs such as Crime Stoppers and Neighborhood Watch to keep homes, workplaces and everywhere in between safe for the entire family. The Sheriff's Office works with municipal agencies such as Butner Public Safety, police departments for the City of Creedmoor and the City of Oxford, and Stem and Stovall police to ensure that the entire county is covered for prompt response to emergencies of all kinds.





# Our municipal partners

A vibrant mix of industry, agriculture, retail, and recreation makes Granville County an ideal location to live, work, and play. Located just north of the Research Triangle Park area, Granville offers accessibility to urban areas along with the friendly atmosphere of small towns. Its five municipalities - Butner, Creedmoor, Oxford, Stem and Stovall - are rich in history and resources.

**Butner:** Located on the southern end of the county and situated just off I-85, Butner was incorporated in 2007. Its proximity to the Research Triangle Park - along with its rich history, industrial marketplace, and close-knit community - make it an ideal location for residents and visitors.



Butner has a rich military history. In the early 1940s, Butner served as a training area for combat troops during World War II, as well as a prisoner-of-war camp. Although closed in 1947, several structures from the camp still remain intact. Today, Butner is home to Murdoch Center, one of three state-operated development centers; Central Regional Hospital, one of three psychiatric hospitals in the state; and the Butner Federal Correctional complex, which includes its own medical center. In addition, the town will soon be home to the Veterans Life Center, which will assist at-risk veterans.



**Creedmoor:** Also located on the southern end of the county, offering a short commute to Raleigh and Durham, Creedmoor is known for its small-town charm, family-friendly events and recreational opportunities. Over the past year, Creedmoor has constructed a new community

center that will feature a full-size gymnasium, elevated walking track, fitness equipment and event rental space adjacent to the renovated senior center. Creedmoor has been designated as a “Playful City USA” by KaBoom, a national nonprofit organization, for prioritizing playful and healthy lifestyles for children of all ages. Creedmoor was honored to be granted this designation each year from 2007 to 2017.

Today, Creedmoor is a thriving community with a population that has doubled over the past 20 years. U.S. Highway 15 passes directly through Creedmoor, leading 16 miles to Durham, while Highway 56 crosses US 15 just west of the center of town. In close proximity to Downtown Creedmoor is Interstate 85, leading southwest to Durham and northeast to Petersburg, VA.



**Oxford:** The City of Oxford, which serves as the county seat, is central to Granville County and has a population of nearly 9,000 residents. Steeped in tradition, Oxford is well known for its agricultural heritage and historic homes. The Granville County Courthouse is also located here.

Oxford was established in 1816 as a center for trade and agriculture, especially tobacco. As the tobacco industry started to decline in the mid-1900’s, local leaders formed an organization to bring more industries to the area. Oxford is now home to several international manufacturing plants.

Beyond industry, Oxford is a picturesque community with a “hometown” atmosphere and has been recognized with a “Main Street USA” accreditation. Take a walking tour of the Historic Preservation District; purchase fresh fruits and vegetables from local farmers markets; shop at friendly family-operated retail stores in histo-




ric downtown Oxford; or dine at one of several locally-owned restaurants. Whether it's history, agriculture, or industry, Oxford has something for everyone.

**Stem:** The Town of Stem is a community of approximately 500 people who pride themselves on offering “small town living at its best.” William Thomas Stem founded the town in 1888, which was derived from the “Tally Ho” township. The Stem family co-owned a general store and a plot of land where the Richmond and Danville Railroad ended and built the town around it. The Town of Stem was incorporated in 1911.



Located just off I-85, Stem is only a twenty-five minute drive from Durham. Its rural charm has lent itself to being home to popular event venues for weddings, fundraisers and special gatherings.



**Stovall:** The Town of Stovall offers a rural lifestyle and a scenic countryside in the northern portion of the county. Located on Hwy 15 North, Stovall is situated between Oxford and Clarksville, Virginia on Hwy. 15 north and includes several family farms and historic areas. Once called “Sassafras Fork Crossroads,”

Stovall was built around the Hico Stagecoach Road and was once the site of a small trading post. The arrival of the Oxford and Clarksville Railroad led to the establishment of the town in 1883.

One of Stovall's most famous residents was John Penn, a member of the Continental Congress and one of three North Carolinians to sign the Declaration of Independence. His plantation was located three miles east of today's Stovall and included more than 7,000 acres. Today, Stovall is home to approximately 500 residents.

# Recreation in Granville



Granville County offers many opportunities to enjoy a healthy lifestyle. From hiking and fishing to disc golf and tournament play, there are many recreational options and activities for all ages.

**Lakes:** Granville County residents and visitors have easy access to five lakes - Falls Lake, Lake Devin, Lake Holt, Lake Rogers and Kerr Lake - and can enjoy fishing, paddle boating, kayaking or picnicking.


**Granville Athletic Park:** Featuring four baseball fields, one half-size and two full-size soccer fields, a nine hole disc golf course, a concession building, sheltered picnic areas, play areas, paved walking trails, a pickle ball court, an



amphitheater, a splash pad and an outdoor classroom space, Granville Athletic Park (GAP) provides an ideal setting for outdoor enjoyment. Covering more than 60 acres in Oxford, the GAP will soon expand into its third phase of development, which will include tennis courts, an all-inclusive playground, open activity space, volleyball courts, horseshoe pits and more opportunities for family fun. Once completed, Phase III will make Granville Athletic Park an 80-acre site, the largest outdoor park in Granville County.

**Wilton Slopes:** Located between Wilton and Oxford on Highway 96 South, this 14-acre park offers a picnic shelter, hiking trails and a canoe/small boat access platform at the starting point of the Tar River Paddle Trail, which connects with the N.C. coast. No reservations are required to use these facilities.

**Butner Athletic Park:** As the newest athletic facility in the southern end of the county, Butner Athletic Park (BAP) features two baseball fields, a softball field, a multi-purpose field, a concession stand and a meeting area, all ideal for tournament play or pickup games.



**Oxford Athletic Park:** Also known as “The Diamonds at Oxford Park,” Oxford Athletic Park, located in the county seat, features four lighted baseball/softball fields, two football fields, two concession stands, a Tot Lot, a walking trail and bleacher seating for league and tournament play.

**Ledge Creek Forest Conservation Area:** The Tar River Land Conservancy owns and manages 398 acres that comprise the Ledge Creek Forest Conservation Area. This acreage, a portion of which is in Stem, includes five miles of hiking and walking trails that are easy to moderate in difficulty. Picnic areas are also available.



**Granville Greenways:** With a mission to enhance the area’s economic and environmental well-being, Granville County and its five municipalities, as well as the local public school system, have partnered to create a system of biking and walking trails which will eventually include 22 trails in

various locations throughout the county. More information is available at [www.granvillegreenways.org](http://www.granvillegreenways.org).

# Events and attractions

## **March:**

**Granville Ambulance Chase and Food Truck Rodeo:** Held in Downtown Oxford, this annual event offers something for everyone, from serious runners to families looking for a day of healthy fun. Proceeds benefit the Granville Health System Foundation.



## **June:**

**Central Children’s Home Parade and Homecoming Celebration:** The Central Children’s Home, a residential child care facility for children who are dependent, neglected or abused, hosts this celebration each year to welcome alumni and bring attention to its important work of caring for children and preparing them for the future. Founded in 1883, the campus is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.



## **Butner Chicken Pickin’**

This weekend-long event features a car show, a tractor show, live music and more. The weekend is highlighted by the wildly-popular BBQ chicken cook-off, where visitors sample entries and vote for the best chicken around. (This event has been cancelled for 2020.)

## **July:**

**Fourth of July Fireworks and Celebration:** Each year, the City of Creedmoor and the Town of Butner come together to host a spectacular fireworks display over scenic Lake Holt. This event, also supported by the City of Oxford and Granville County, brings thousands of residents together in a show of patriotism and community pride.



## **September:**

**N.C. Hot Sauce Contest:** This annual festival brings thousands of residents and visitors to Downtown Oxford, and features a wide variety of hot sauces and barbecue sauces from all over the state. Taste tests, music, crafts, food trucks and a popular pepper-eating contest round out the festivities.

**Creedmoor Music Festival:** This annual street festival attracts music and food lovers alike. Participants can enjoy music by local bands in a wide variety of genres, handcrafted merchandise, fresh food and family-friendly activities which showcase everything the community has to offer.



## **October:**

**Masonic Home for Children Homecoming Festival:** This celebration of the state's first home for children honors its alumni and the Masons who made the home possible. The weekend kicks off on Friday with an annual golf tournament, followed by a Yard Party - and on Saturday is the state's largest Shrine Parade and a BBQ cookoff.



**Lord Granville Agricultural Heritage Harvest Festival:** Held in Butner, this event showcases the county's agricultural heritage with a display of vintage tractors, farm implements, antique engines and more. A tractor parade highlights this festival, as well as food, crafts and family fun.

**Military History Show:** This event is presented each year at the Henderson-Oxford Airport and is open to the public. On display are artifacts, weapons, uniforms and equipment from wartime eras throughout our history. Military re-enactments are also held throughout the day. This popular event is sponsored by Granville County's Veterans Affairs Committee.

# Art, music and more



**Cedar Creek Gallery:** Located in Creedmoor, this family-owned and operated art gallery showcases the works of more than 200 craftspeople from all over the country. All work, which is displayed and sold on site, is hand-crafted. Cedar Creek Gallery also offers private studios for potters and glassblowers. Events open to the public include a Pottery and Glass Festivals in the Spring and in the Fall, the National Teapot Show, and a Holiday Open House.



**History museums and libraries:** Helping preserve Granville County's history are several museums: the Granville County Historical Society Museum/Harris Exhibit Hall; the George C. Shaw Museum; the Oak Hill Heritage House Museum and Research Library; and the Sallie Mae Ligon Museum and Archive. All are open to the public during scheduled hours and attract visitors from all over the state. In addition, the Richard H. Thornton Library in Oxford - one of four library branches in the county - features a "North Carolina Room" where historical records and documents are housed for research and for genealogical background information.



**Granville Little Theater (GLT):** A volunteer-driven theater, Granville Little Theater has been performing for local audiences for more than 40 years. All cast members and crew are residents of the area who have a love of theater and for working on (and off) the stage. Pictured is a performance of "Smoke on the Mountain" from 2019.

**Alive After Five:** Live music, great food and a festive atmosphere are enjoyed at any of the scheduled "Alive After Five" events hosted by the Granville County Chamber of Commerce. A variety of music is provided as hundreds of residents from all over the area come together to dance the night away at summertime events held in Oxford, Butler and Creedmoor.
