The Granville County Juvenile Crime Prevention Council (JCPC) has studied the risk factors and needs of Juvenile Court involved youth in this county and hereby publishes this Request for Proposals. The JCPC anticipates funds from the NC Department of Public Safety (DPS) in the amount stated above to fund the program types specified below. Such programs will serve delinquent and at-risk youth for the State fiscal year 2021-2022/23 beginning on, or after, July 1, 2021. The use of these funds in this county requires a local match in the amount specified above. The Juvenile Crime Prevention Council may recommend certain programs for one or two-year funding awards dependent upon program performance, compliance with JCPC policy, and the availability of state JCPC allocation funds.

## Based on identified needed programs the JCPC will consider proposals for the following needed program types:

Proposed program services should target the following concerns as reported in the Risk and Needs Factors for delinquency or repeat delinquency. Information below represents the 42 youth assessed at juvenile intake from July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020:

- 23% of youth at intake were assessed as Risk Level 5 vs State Average of 14%, indicating GC youth are higher risk when coming to intake
- 28% of youth at intake in Granville needed substance assessment and/or trx vs 12% State Average 16% higher and indicates the need for substance abuse assessment
- 64% of youth at intake in Granville presented with moderate to serious school behavior problems on par with State average but problem school behavior continues to be a significant future indicator of delinquency
- 17% of youth at intake presented as gang member or associate vs 6% for Statewide Average. Overall, 77% GC youth at intake lacked positive peer associations vs 60% for State Average. This would seem to indicate the need for programs centered around skills to help youth develop pro social relationships
- 36% of youth at intake presented a runaway history vs 17% for Statewide Average.
- 30% of youth at intake in Granville were functioning below grade level vs 8% for Statewide Average. This needs factor is most likely underreported
- 37% of youth at intake in Granville presented with conflict in the home (domestic discord or violence) vs. 21% for Statewide Average
- 76% of youth at intake in Granville presented with marginal or inadequate parental supervision vs 46% for Statewide Average. Indicates a need for parenting programs.
- 26% of youth at intake presented with problem sexual behavior that included either dangerous sex practices or victimization of others vs 8% for Statewide Average.

## Applicants are being sought that are able to address the legislatively mandated items below

- 1. Program services compatible with research that is shown to be effective with juvenile offenders.
- 2. Program services are outcome-based.
- 3. The program has an evaluation component.
- 4. Program services detect gang participation and divert individuals
